

WHAT DOES 'INCARNATIONAL MINISTRY' LOOK LIKE?



For years Carl Lentz was pastor to the most exclusively hip and famous crowd in New York City. As senior pastor of a large church in a city where image is everything, Lentz made a point to reach out to pop singers and sports stars wherever he could. In the locker rooms of a Knicks game and at the hottest nightclubs afterwards, Lentz was there dressed in the latest fashions and a part of the scene. When questioned about how this was appropriate conduct for a gospel preacher, Lentz replied that celebrities need Jesus just as much as anyone else, and this was his method of bringing Jesus to them. He was being the presence of Jesus to those amid a materialistic world, ready to speak the Good Word and be accepted when the time was right. For a while it seemed like Lentz had it figured out, until last month a very public incident of moral failure saw him removed from his church position. Most of his celebrity flock indulged in the ultimate act of personal rejection by Unfollowing him on social media.

This example came to mind as I came to consider the topic of "incarnational ministry". To some the term may be familiar, to others probably less so, and is one that has tended to provoke strong feelings (both positive and negative). However, I believe that the key to true incarnational ministry must start with our approach, our

presuppositions and theological vision, so that we can hit that fairway of good discipleship and practice while avoiding the weeds. The concept of incarnational ministry has a long history, but has had a burst of popularity in recent times through influential works by Ray Sherman Anderson, Paul Hiebert and more recently Sam Wells. Broadly, their concern was how both the corporate church and individual Christians should "be Christ" to their communities, to have Christ incarnated in their lives and words to provide an authentic witness to a world that needs to know God. If Christians were more concerned with their incarnational witness rather than maintaining cultural and dogmatic forms of religiosity then the Kingdom would be flourishing rather than withering.

The incarnational ministry model has in turn received some pushback from the likes of Tim Chester and Ekhard Schnabel, who observed incarnation language has the potential to detract from the uniqueness of Christ and the ongoing mediation of the Spirit. There also seemed to be assumptions that cultural practices and expressions are merely the "packaging" of the Gospel rather than speaking directly to it, and thus much was affirmed that should have been rejected. These critiques are not without some merit.

However, does this mean that we should reject the concept of incarnational ministry wholesale? Is it possible for us to hold to historic faith and practices, and yet at the same time speak with relevance to our changing culture as well as new contexts? How might our ministry be truly incarnational?

First, we must affirm the unique historic reality of the incarnation of God the Son as a result of an eternal divine decision to be For humanity. The declaration of the apostle Peter in Acts 2:36 that Jesus has been made Lord and Christ is highly particular and excludes the possibility of any other claiming those titles. When the Word became flesh (Jn 1:14) he assumed and brought to himself something that was not his own. While humanity may follow this human example, they do not retake the divine path to a nature not their own, but instead emulate that which is already theirs. There is but One Christ and we are not him.

Second, our identity as disciples is caught up with the Incarnate One. Christians are not defined primarily by our earthly identity, but our

heavenly one, whereby we are united by faith with the One who has taken on our flesh and reigns over all. As such, Christians are called to live out that identity for which we were predestined and chosen through the good service that God has determined for us (Eph 1:11-12). We do not, therefore, live for ourselves but for the Incarnate One who lives!

Third, our identity in the Incarnate One will lead us to witness to our world as much by our heavenly identity as by our practical love. Our witness will not primarily be about "bringing Jesus down", as if the redemption of God must be summoned by our obedience, but in how our rejection of the evil of this world testifies to the reality of Christ who became united to this world in order to redeem it. The grace of God enables us not to be conformed to this world, but to reject it's call on us so that the Christ who gives hope may be seen MORE clearly (Tit 2:11-14). In our living for God rather than the World we will display more fully how the God who Lives and is present by his Spirit calls all people to recognise him directly.

THE PRAYER BOOK—OUR PRAYER BOOK


A resource compiled by many, for the benefit of many, many years ago!

We, perhaps, ought to give thanks to God that plagiarism laws were not in place as the idea of a unifying/ common prayer book began to be conceived. The church men involved drew on many other traditions, wordings and customs to have a prayer book for the common people that would define and show the strength of a Church of England.

Having read this so far, you would guess that the existing Church of England was fractured big time. To begin with, the people of the nation was almost totally illiterate, including the priesthood. Then, there were different traditions in almost every hamlet. There were different theologies of the Mass, of Ordination, of the Scriptures and all this was encapsulated by a class society bound by animism, witchcraft and idolatry. Almost as bad as today!

Step up to the mark: Thomas Cranmer.

As well as being the Archbishop of Canterbury, Thomas Cranmer was a very resourceful man, with contacts throughout great Britain and the continent, including Russian, Greek and Arminian Orthodox contacts.



First came the idea for a lectionary to establish a systematic reading through the Bible in two or three years.

Then the 1549 book — a rag- tag collection of services from all over the place. This book was to be a starting point, a first attempt, but never intended as a final, authoritative book.

The year 1552. This was THE book. The definitive book establishing theology, liturgy and classless worship. This book was intended to be the English expression of reformed theology.


Yes, yes, I know; there was a lot of history, a lot of kings and queens, any amount of politics, even the clergy and their ideas. And there was still Lords of their Manors, and plebs like me; all feeding their ideas and traditions into the cauldron of liturgical pottage, out of which the 1662 Book of Common Prayer emerged.



The goal is to assist with the salaries of the teachers at Christ the King School, Port Moresby and provision of set text books for those studying for ministry at Newton Theological College.

A list of the set text books has been distributed through parishes, if any one has any of these books in their libraries and willing to donate them. With the Government now demanding a higher level of achievement for the granting of diplomas and degrees it is so important that students have access to relevant publications. Canon Val Gribble will organise the freight of such books through her family member who works in Port Moresby.

Half of the funds raised will be sent to NTC where Bishop Jeffrey Driver (ex Archbishop of Adelaide) will organise the purchase of the books. The other half of funds will go to teachers at Christ the King School, who have received next to no allowance this year. COVID19 has had a drastic monetary affect on ACPNG, with student allowances at Newton, priest's stipends, and teacher's allowances all being drastically reduced.

ADOPT-A-FAMILY

Each year AnglicareCQ run the Adopt-a-Family Christmas Hamper drive. This year 90 families have been adopted by the generosity of businesses and individuals in the community. Also, 179 single hampers and 20 family hampers have been put together by the wonderful generosity of the Anglican volunteers led by Diana Wode.



We have received outstanding donations of toys, food and monetary support but with the extra pressures added to families this year we are still receiving hamper requests and this will continue right up to Christmas Eve.

To try to deliver on these requests we are asking if people are able to make up what we are calling a "festive" hamper. This hamper has some staple groceries but also the Christmas extras like custard, jelly, pudding, cake and the little touches like baubles or table cloth, Christmas paper plates. Archdeacon Tom Henderson-Brooks led the service in prayer and a reflection upon the Heart of Thanksgiving - understanding God's grace to us.

After directing our prayers and worship to our God who is forever faithful, members of the



community had opportunity to share their own thoughts and feelings and express their own gratitude for what has been accomplished at Tanyalla over so many years.

The local Lions Association showed their love and support by cooking a BBQ and feeding all in attendance.

EXPLAINING CHRISTMAS TO KIDS



WHAT DO I TELL THEM ABOUT SANTA AND REINDEER?

Do your kids get presents from Santa?

Ours don't. They never have.

It can be rather awkward at the check-out when the person serving us asks our kids "have you been good this year?" then they add "You'd better be good or Santa won't come". It is at this point, with my children looking blankly up with their big eyes, like butter wouldn't melt in their mouth, then I say "Nah, we don't believe in Santa".

The stares! The horror! And then the backtracking, "Oh, isn't good we can all believe in different things". (I wonder, do I tell them it may simply be because it is cheaper not to buy our kids presents from Santa?)

There are so many places to start this topic. There is the dreaded "the anagram for Santa is...", or "Santa rides boomers, not reindeer" on one side, or "you gotta let them have a little magic" and "don't let your kids spoil it for mine" on the other side.

But, what should we, as Bible believing Christians, be teaching our children about Santa and his reindeer?

We are so blessed by God to have his word which is clear on how the first advent occurred, and what God was doing in his world to save his people through it, we read in Matthew 1

18 Now the birth of Jesus Christ took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been betrothed to Joseph, before they came together she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. 21 She will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." 22 All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet: 23 "Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall call his name Immanuel"

This, therefore, is really where we should start teaching our children what is happening at Christmas time. When we teach our children truth the Bible says in Proverbs 22:6

“Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it.”

We can have confidence that when we train our children with the Bible they will be better equipped to live in the world and not be of it. If our goal is to do what God has commanded us and to teach our children that God is God and they are not, that Jesus died that they may live, and to forgive as they have been forgiven, then we will be pointing them to the Bible in all we do and they do, training them in righteousness, as our ministers do for their congregations. Our children are our first “flock”.

Back to the question: “What do I teach my child about Santa and his reindeer?”

One thing we can teach our children about is Saint Nicholas, the archetypal Santa Claus, from whom every Santa Claus gets his name. We can tell our kids that yes, there was an amazing man, who loved God because God first loved him, and showed generosity to children because he was shown the generosity of God’s love.

Here is a man who we can follow the example of as he followed the example of Christ. We can remember him and give gifts to each other as God gave the gift of his son to us. It is a good thing to remember and give thanks for the joy and peace that truly entered the world in the form of a tiny baby, Jesus, which we feel when we think of Santa.

So, go on, give good gifts and have good fun, and teach your kids that Christmas is where God showed his joy, peace and generosity to us, which we are reminded of by that jolly **Ho, Ho, Ho**. And also remember to constantly be pointing your kids to Christ, who is better than Santa, because his gift is eternal, even the original Saint Nick knew that.



WHAT ARE YOUR KIDS WATCHING?

An American cartoon series on Netflix? Or their favourite channel on Youtube? Or even Sesame Street. Take the time to watch it as a family and talk about what it's teaching. Every movie and book is teaching something. It could be that the family dog is smarter than Daddy, the highest goal in life is to be nice, Karma or an extreme version of gender theory. Whatever is going on, use it as a great teaching time for understanding what their world is teaching, but also what does the Bible say about these everyday aspects of life. A great way to train kids to be discerning. You may, as a family explain that the kids are not to watch that show alone or that it suggests unhelpful ideas, and use these opportunities to help them with their interpretation of the events that they are viewing.

A great commentary of how American’s view the gospel and the many false gospels that are being preached. What do we do with the churches of 40,000 that seem so smooth? What about the televangelists that seem to need so much money for their new private jet. Do they follow the same Jesus as us? This documentary shows the problem with these false gospels, while the true Biblical Gospel shines through very clearly. As a family, try watching it in 20 minute blocks, stopping to discuss the ideas that the movie raised.

KAREEN'S KITCHEN

Christmas treats, I hear you say! And something the kids can do while you get on with the main event? Sounds good to me!

I thought I'd share with you a few no cook, sweet treats, suitable for taking to the next Christmas party or just snacking on at home during all the festivities. The first 3 recipes are for the slightly older child who can use a microwave with confidence.



MARS BAR CRACKLE PUDDINGS

Ingredients

- 200g chopped mars bars
- 2 tblsp cream
- 2 tsp sifted cocoa
- 3 cups rice bubbles
- 100g white chocolate
- 24 smarties/m&ms
- Spray oil or butter to oil the mini muffin tray

Method

1. Melt mars bars, cream and cocoa in the microwave in 30 second bursts stirring in between until melted and smooth.
2. Put rice bubbles in a bowl, add the mars bar mix and stir through.
3. Grease the mini muffin tin and add some of the mix to each cup, pressing down so they stick together well.
4. Place in the fridge for 2 hours (or 15 min in the freezer should do)
5. Once chilled, turn out upside down onto a plate to decorate.
6. Melt the white chocolate and spoon a little bit on top of each pudding, adding a smartie to look like a cherry.

FESTIVE FUDGE BALLS

Ingredients

- 450g Chocolate melts
- 1 tin condensed milk
- Hundreds and thousands or coating of choice

Method

1. Place chocolate in a micro wave safe bowl and melt for 1 min, stir and then heat in 10 sec intervals until completely melted.

4. When ready to serve, take out and break into shards and enjoy. 😊








The 3 big questions for a frantic family. Patrick Lencioni







The Promise. Naomi Reed



The Screwtape letters CS Lewis

COVID SAFE UPDATE - DECEMBER 2020

As we come towards the end of the year, it is a time where we naturally reflect on the year that has been, and what a year it has been! 2020 is a year which has thrown us some new and unique challenges, but through this has come much to be thankful for and to celebrate. There have been highs and lows, we have learned a string of new skills and terminology, and we have all been challenged and stretched in ways we hadn't even considered only 12 months ago.

Now that the pandemic is well under control in Australia, Governments and their health advisory teams are starting to use a new term "COVID-normal". This simply means, until vaccinations can be made broadly available, we can expect a period of stability in what it means to be a COVIDsafe church.

What does COVID-normal church look like for ACCQ churches?

- All churches are now working to person capacity ratio of 1 person per 2sqm. We must also continue to allow for 1.5m between non-related/household seating.
- Funerals in a church complying with COVID Industry plan may now have up to 200 people attend regardless of the size of the building.
- Weddings in a church complying with COVID Industry plan may now have up to 200 people attend regardless of the size of the building. For weddings seating should allow for 1.5m between attendees where possible.
- Food service requirements remain unchanged.

- All hygiene practices including ministry practices and the preparation and distribution of communion remain unchanged.
- Building ventilation and cleaning requirements remain unchanged.
- Administration of contact tracing details remains unchanged.
- Administration for events and activities remains unchanged.
- Administration for hall hire remains unchanged.

We have come so far as a church family this year, and I am truly grateful for the way that our parishes have embraced what is needed to continue to worship and grow and reach out to our communities. It is important at this time that we do not become complacent; COVID-normal does not mean that the virus has been eradicated; it simply means that our health system is coping, that the number of active cases are low, and that the risk of community transmission is considered low. With the relaxing of some restrictions and the opening of borders, Health advisors tell us that the risk of virus transmission remains real and are asking us to remain vigilant.
